NEWS IN BRIEF

<u>Planning a PlAAC Response at OVAE.</u> On November 12th, the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) released its "Time for the U.S. to Reskill?" report. This followed publication of the "Literacy, Numeracy, and Problem Solving in Technology-Rich Environments Among U.S. Adults" report (the "First Look" report) released in October. The Office of Vocational and Adult Education of the U.S. Department of Education commissioned the report to look more analytically at PIAAC's U.S. findings and consider some appropriate responses.

OVAE is currently using the two reports to support a series of national and regional "engagement" events, a process by which they will gather stakeholder input and information from around the country to help them develop a strong national adult education initiative. Among other things, OVAE wants to scale up proven practices and use technology to expand access, build stronger partnerships to "sustain the nation's workforce capacity, economic vitality, and democratic values," and launch new activities to strengthen the connection between adult basic skills and workforce readiness.

On November 19th, Assistant Secretary Brenda Dann-Messier sponsored a private invitational dinner for about 50 national adult education leaders. It was held at the home of Dan and Sunita Leeds in Georgetown (Dan Leeds is president of the National Public Education Support Fund and Chair of the Alliance of Excellent Education). Among the invitees were CAAL, CLASP, the National Coalition for Literacy, the Dollar General Corporation, ETA of the Department of Labor, and the White House Domestic Policy Council. At that event we considered various questions posed by OVAE and offered an initial set of suggestions.

A series of public invitational "stakeholder engagements" are also planned. The first was held November 20th in D.C. and others will follow through January in Philadelphia, Chicago, Cleveland, San Jose, and Boston. Local groups can also hold their own "engagement" events if they wish and OVAE is providing resources to help them do that (see http://www.timetoreskill.org for more information). It should be noted that OECD's Program for International Student Assessment (PISA) was issued in November. This assessment is carried out every three years and measures 15-year-olds'

"literacy levels" in reading, math, and science. Among the PISA findings is that poverty is "more crushing" in the U.S. judging from low test score results and that in the U.S. 15-year-olds are a priority challenge in terms of being work- or job-ready when they leave high school. Urgent action is needed to counter these problems, the report concludes. Copies are available from http://nces.ed.gov/surveys/pisa.



New SkillsToolkit. The Manufacturing Institute, an affiliate of the National Institute of Manufacturing (NAM), has announced a new Skills Certification System Toolkit for employers, adult education groups, and others who provide skills training for jobs in manufacturing. A guide titled **Developing Skilled Workers** offers steps, templates, and a range of other resources to help education/training providers develop appropriate services that will qualify adults for jobs according to standards that employers can count on. The guide was written by representatives of small, medium, and large manufacturing firms in cooperation with the Institute and is endorsed by NAM. The **Institute's website** also provides resources to help programs serve veterans and others in a way that qualifies them for manufacturing jobs.



IHA's Health Literacy Listserv. Good news bears repeating. This new listserv, announced in CAAL's last E-News, is very active and engaging. The listserv was launched only a few weeks ago by the **Institute for Healthcare Advancement**, a nonprofit organization dedicated to "empowering people to better health." It is already enjoying vibrant daily discussions on various topics, and its subscriber base has grown well beyond its initial 1,500. Offered at no charge, it is an informative and stimulating resource for anyone interested in health literacy. The Game Changers. Complete College America recently published the first issue of its newsletter, called "Complete College America: The Movement." The organization is dedicated to enhancing college completion, with one focus on low-skilled adults. The first issue presents a variety of data and information on this topic. It also provides a link to a major new report put out in October: **The Game Changers: Are states implementing the best reforms to get more college graduates**? It focuses on "proven strategies that lead to real and lasting results" and on methods that create the conditions for success and pathways for achieving success.



Centre for Literacy Summer Institute. Canada's Centre for Literacy will hold a Summer Institute in Montreal from June 25-27, 2014. Among the themes they will examine are Aging and Skills Loss, Technology and Learning, and Making Connections between PISA and PIAAC. The Australian Council for Educational Research, the Center for the Study of Adult Literacy (University of Georgia), the National Centre of Literacy and Numeracy for Adults (New Zealand), and The National Research and Development Center for Adult Literacy and Numeracy (United Kingdom) are co-sponsors of the effort.
